### GOVERNOR ANNOUNCES COMPANY EXPANSIONS

**G**overnor McAuliffe recently announced the expansion of Standard Calibrations, Inc. (SCI), a global instrumentation and controls company based in Chesapeake. The company will invest \$508,500 to expand its engineering operations, creating 150 new jobs.

On August 9, the City of Chesapeake, Department of Economic Development facilitated a meeting with SCI, which was attended by Karen Jackson, Virginia's Secretary of Technology, and the region's leading workforce partners. The meeting proved instrumental in assisting SCI to develop a talent recruitment strategy and formalized the Apprenticeship Training Program for the company's new Data Center Division. Starting salary for these positions will range from \$37,000 to \$85,000 annually.

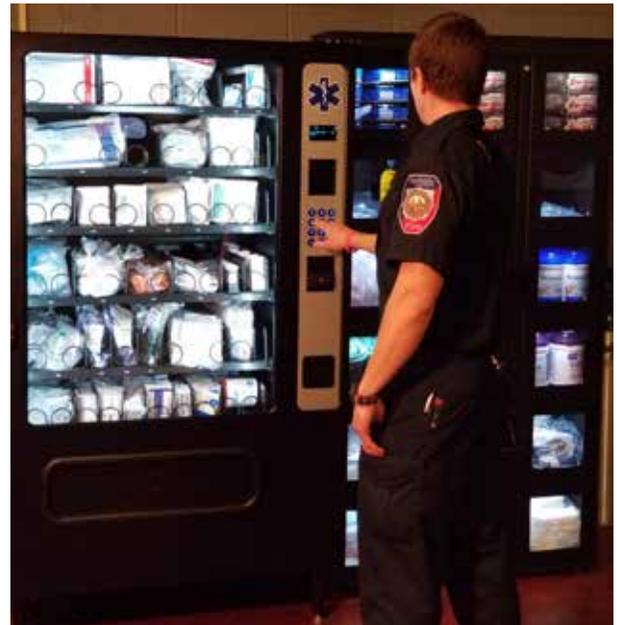

### DEPARTMENT IMPLEMENTS NEW MEDICAL SUPPLY PROCESS

**I**n November, the Chesapeake Fire Department (CFD) began the implementation of a new process for medical supply dispensing known as UCapIT, a 24/7 state-of-the-art system that allows for secure web-based tracking of the dispensing of medical supplies and pharmaceuticals. This system allows crews to resupply their units any time during the day or night, improving back-in-service times and allowing the department greater accountability and tracking of supplies.

The new process will reduce costs through real-time tracking of supplies, provide the ability to do just-in-time ordering, monitor expiration dates to reduce waste, and reduce staff hours spent ordering, pulling and distributing medical supplies. The system uses vending style machines to store and dispense supplies. Each machine is connected to the internet for real-time tracking and reporting of supplies. Security features are built into the software controls, giving employees access to certain supplies. Additional security measures are in place for medications and highly sensitive, or high valued items.

The CPD is installing machines at stations within large service areas of the City. Through a partnership with Chesapeake Regional Medical Center (CRMC), a machine will be installed in the CRMC Emergency Department for units to re-supply the bulk of what they routinely use while at the hospital, increasing unit availability. The CFD will fully implement the system by January 2018. Once the system is fully operational, the department will track supply usage and costs to show a return on investment to the City, and look at opportunities to expand the program to additional fire stations in the future.
